This Workshop is organized by Florence Ninitte and Irene Reginato, Post-doc researchers at the University of Nantes within the ERC Synergy Grant EuQu project ‘The European Qur'an. Islamic Scripture in European Culture and Religion 1150-1850 (EuQu)’.

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Florence NINITTE gained a BA and MA in Romance Studies at the Université catholique de Louvain where she also achieved a PhD in Medieval Languages in December 2016. Her doctoral dissertation considers the reception and the integration of Arabic texts about Islam in the *Speculum historiale* (SH) and in its French translation by Jean de Vignay. Her research focuses on the indirect reception of the Qur'an in the medieval French literature, through the Latin version of the *Risālat al-Kindī*.

Irene REGINATO gained a joint PhD in Romance Philology at Ca 'Foscari University of Venice and École Pratique des Hautes Études in Paris with a dissertation on the Catalan version of Marco Polo's *Devisement du Monde*. Her main research interests focus on travel and crusade literature in romance languages. She has been a member of the EuQu Project since 2019 and she is now working on the critical edition of Jean Germain's *Trésor des simples* (1447-1451).



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
